2016 OAAPI Legislative Day

Summary Report

Online Registration & Post-Survey

The 2016 OAAPI
Legislative Day was
hosted on November 4th

at the Ohio Statehouse. Over 70 registered participants attended the event. While few written feedback surveys were collected at the end of the legislative day, we had a greater than average response rate to our online post-survey. This report was created using the feedback from the post-survey.

Orientation

Overall, we received positive feedback on the legislative advocacy day orientation and talking points handouts provided to



inform legislative day participants regarding the selected OAAPI advocacy issues.

Areas for improvement include providing more training related to understanding the selected advocacy issues during the orientation in order to empower participants to actively participate and speak to their legislators during the legislative visits.

Reception

This year, the OAAHC changed the time of the



Legislative day from morning/afternoon, to afternoon/early evening. The change in the legislative day schedule created to several logistical challenges, including the statehouse building doors being locked at 5pm, which resulted in lower attendance for the evening reception. Out-of-town participants expressed a preference for lunch, rather than an evening reception for future events.

Welcome Ceremony

The welcome ceremony led by Cora Munoz and Michael Byun provided an opportunity for the community to celebrate recent accomplishments and milestones of OAAHC coalition member organizations.



Legislative Panel

The legislative panel moderated by Rebecca Nelson provided opportunities for community members to engage state representatives about issues affecting the Asian American and Pacific Islander community. Participating state representatives included Niraj Antani, Kevin Boyce, Kristin Boggs, and Kent Smith. Possible areas for improvement include providing additional opportunities for the audience to ask questions in-person, rather than only submitting written questions, and reducing the time allotted for the legislative panel in order to increase time for the group legislative visits.



Keynote Speaker



The keynote speaker for the 2016 OAAPI Legislative Day was Michigan State Senator Hoon-Young Hopgood, who shared his personal experiences as an Asian American adoptee in Michigan and the story of his

journey to a career in public service. Many participants expressed gratitude for the time and distance Senator Hopgood travelled to attend the event. Potential opportunities for improvement include inviting more local leaders AAPI leaders to participate in future events.

Group Legislative Visits

Overall, participants expressed a positive experience with the group legislative visits and a desire for more information and training on the selected advocacy issues, earlier participant education and training prior to legislative day, and increased time for the group legislative visits. Potential areas for improvement noted in post-surveys included grouping participants for legislative visits by region, and coordinating visits with state representatives rather than legislative aides.
